Austria's top Rieslings in 2021



Paula's second report from this year's Traditionsweingüter tasting in Austria. Last week was <u>Grüner Veltliner</u>. Now we dive into Riesling, with the odd Weissburgunder and Carnuntum Blaufränkisch for good measure. Above, Sandra and Johannes Hirsch of Weingut Hirsch in Kamptal.

With Germany as your neighbour, growing a reputation for your Riesling isn't easy. The white-wine superstar makes up 24% of all Germany's vine plantings and is found in each of that nation's 13 winegrowing regions. That kind of dominance can suck all the air out of an international comparison. After all, Riesling doesn't even quite hit 5% of Austria's land under vine and is found primarily in a lean cluster of four regions along the Danube.

But what Austria lacks in numbers, it more than makes up in focus.

For starters, most Austrian Rieslings are dry. In a bow to climate and geography, Riesling feels quite at home in the exposed, stony terraces of the Wachau, Kremstal, Kamptal and Traisental. These outcrops provide the exposure needed for the fruit to reach full ripeness and, by extension, full fermentation to a dry wine. Add in large diurnal temperature shifts and plentiful wind, and you have conditions that eliminate the risk of complacency in the vines. They are challenged and thrive all the more for it.

But focus refers to Riesling style as well. The Austrian expression is not, by and large, what I would call playful. No nimble woodland sprites straight out of Shakespeare's *Midsummer Night's Dream* here. Austrian Rieslings are deliberate, driven, stony, sometimes steely, highly structured and often herbal. They tend to be fuller-bodied, more sinewy and less fruit-defined than their German counterparts. Yet, there is no skimping on the hallmark acidity and aromas. Vintage 2021 showcased this perhaps more than ever.

The downside of focus is that it doesn't leave a lot of cushion or hedge. Like a singer approaching a big solo, there's no room to slide into the right note. You have to commit and either hit it full-on the first time, or not at all. 'Acidity was the great challenge with Riesling in 2021', said Lorenz Haas-Allram of Weingut Allram in Kamptal in a recent email exchange. 'You had to accept and embrace it as a producer instead of worrying about the rather high levels or, worse, try to cover it with too much residual sugar or adjustment.'

But those who did hit it, with focus no less, saw it resonate far and wide. '2021 was a very homogeneous vintage in terms of quality of appellation', continued Allram. 'Our younger Riesling vines from Gaisberg, which are the basis of our Riesling Strass, showed great ripeness and concentration. We actually had a hard time downgrading it to our village wine and not just adding it to our Gaisberg Riesling.'

Gaisberg, together perhaps with Heiligenstein, is always a favourite site to taste at this event. It is like an Austrian Mount Olympus: a terraced peak where the Hera and Zeus of the nation's winemaking, Grüner Veltliner and Riesling, reside in equal standing, bringing forth entirely singular expressions. 'The 2021 Rieslings are showing terroir already', said Johannes Hirsch of the eponymous **Kamptal** estate which produced admirable

expressions of both varieties, 'Even though these GVs are some of the best we've ever produced, the varietal aromas are still – at the moment – dominating the site character. It 's a bit like discussing which is better: Bach or Beethoven, Haarland or Mbappé.'

After tasting both, I can affirm the only possible answer is 'yes, please'.

In the regions of **Traisental** and **Kremstal**, the Rieslings softened a bit, replacing that stony and powerful Kamptal edge with a more mouth-watering and loess-laced juiciness. The rains throughout spring and summer left a good reservoir and encouraged even flowering. Labour in the vineyard was intense, especially in the organically farmed estates – which constitute 15.3% of all Austrian winegrowing at the last count – but those who stayed the course were richly rewarded. After nine months of rain, a dry autumn with chilly nights was made to order for an excellent Riesling harvest. 'The grapes hung, picture-perfect, right up through early to mid November when we harvested them, botrytis-free and in peak form. One thing that stood out was the very low pH value even though the fruit was fully ripe. We needed only the smallest amount of sulphur, a significant indicator of very fresh and ageworthy wines', Patrick Proidl of Weingut Proidl in Kremstal confirmed to me. 'With the acceleration of climate change, Riesling is for me more exciting and holds an advantage [over Grüner Veltliner] because the acidity helps maintain good tension. But we rarely have problems with acidity in Senftenberg – often quite the opposite!'

(While Wachau is arguably one of Riesling's Austrian strongholds, those wines were tasted in a separate event hosted by the Vinea Wachau and will be the subject of a separate article.)

And then there is the Riesling coda, in this case a handful of beautiful Blaufränkisch from one of Austria's youngest DACs, **Carnuntum**. The best revealed a fruit purity and freshness that made them quite simply a joy to taste. There was not a trace of anything tired or stewed. The region has made incredible strides towards finding its signature style, and this vintage was infused with continued restraint, refinement and understanding of site. In fact, even the more ethereal, evergreen tension I was expecting from last year's wines was relaxed with a delightful and surprising juiciness. And yet there was more than enough structure to suggest that the youthful approachability would in no way compromise longevity. These wines will continue to develop for many years to come.

Among the 70 wines reviewed below, the many Rieslings are grouped by region, followed by a Weissburgunder group and finally the reds. Within each group the wines are presented in alphabetical order by producer, but you can reorder them to suit.

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

It transcends the variety in the pursuit of place. Sublime balance and infinitely approachable despite its youth. (PS)
